#### The Headmaster's Review of the Week

Dear Bedian Family,

As I write at the conclusion of an exciting, hopeful and purposeful week here at St Bede's, I am reflecting upon how immensely proud I feel after my first Remembrance Service as Headmaster of this fine institution. I was extremely moved by the solemn, respectful and impeccable manner in which our fantastic pupils observed the occasion and the tremendous contributions from my colleagues in putting together and participating in this incredibly important event. I wish that a great many of you could also have been present to witness at first hand further confirmation of why this school is such a special place.

Our theme of the week has been "Remembrance" – as we remember those who have died in the armed services, we also remember in a special way this month all of our loved ones who have gone before us to the Lord. I would encourage you to please take time this month to visit the College Chapel and to place their names in the remembrance basket. As Scripture says: "Those that are judged worthy of a place in the other world and in the resurrection from the dead are the same as the angels, and being children of the resurrection they are sons of God" (Luke 20: 35-36).

Just before the College broke up for half term, it was my absolute pleasure to host a delegation of Chinese educational leaders here at St Bede's. It was an opportunity for them to be shown around our exceptional school (the only independent school in the North of England which they visited), to be able to learn more about the life of the College and to benefit from a Q&A session held in the Vaughan Library and chaired by Mr Roberts, our Academic Deputy Head, and myself. All of our guests were incredibly complimentary about our school - its wonderfully unique and atmospheric site and our brilliant pupils and staff - and I would like to thank everyone who assisted with their visit.

I am currently in the process of meeting with every Year 11 pupil individually over the course of this half term in order to catch up after a busy start to the academic year and to be able to find out how their lives at the College are progressing. Time spent with our young people remains the absolute highlight of each week for me at St Bede's and I continue to be inspired by the wonderful journeys all our pupils have embarked upon. It was also a pleasure for me to attend our Year 11 Parents' Evening last night and to be able to speak with a great many pupils and their families over the course of the evening. I would also like to pay tribute to my teaching and operational colleagues who yet again worked tirelessly over the course of the event in order to ensure that our pupils and their families had the most positive, impactful and reassuring experience possible. This is an intense and challenging year for all of our public examination pupils but they have the constant reassurance of the steadfast support of their families, their friends and everyone at the College to help them through.

Before I conclude my review, I would like to highlight a very important upcoming College event the week after next – our inaugural Development and Fundraising Information Evening which will take place at the College on Wednesday 20th November from 7 – 8pm. The event is my opportunity to inform parents and colleagues (past and present), alumni and a range of other interested parties about the ambitious and aspirational plans which the College has for further developing our main site and our Sports Ground, as well as for growing our Bursary Fund. The sole aim of our new and permanent Development and Fundraising campaign is to ensure that the educational experiences for all of our pupils is of the highest quality and that our entire site is able to facilitate a truly innovative and aspirational 21st Century curriculum of exciting opportunities. We are also determined to be able to widen access to a Bedian education to a much broader range of young people here in Manchester by offering fee assistance on a significantly larger scale to the many disadvantaged families in our city. This new and lasting campaign has an entirely different focus to the 2020 vision appeal which was launched a number of years ago and I am hopeful that a great many of you will be able to join us at the event to learn more. I am sorry that a number of you feel let down following the cessation of the 2020 vision appeal and I sincerely hope that you will afford me the opportunity to make amends.

He smashed the ball home and ensured the boys progressed to the next round. They will take on a strong Cardinal Heenan side on Monday next week.


As we remember those who have died in the armed services, we also

#### **STEM**

On Friday 18 October Prep 5 and Prep 6 were visited by Bedian Alumnus Mike Walsh. Mike talked about his role as a Satellite Communications Technology specialist. He discussed with the pupils how satellites are orbiting the earth and what their functions are. Then he told them about his role where he is ensuring we receive better broadband.

His company are launching MEO (Medium Earth Orbit) satellites that orbit the earth closer than regular satellites and on a different angle and trajectory. There will be a conveyor belt effect of satellites that circle the earth giving us ultra-fast broadband and better global communication.

The children were fascinated by his job. Mike in turn was astounded by the children's prior knowledge on satellites and space but also their reasoning when asked to solve high order problems about the positioning of satellites.

We would like to thank Mike for taking the time out to talk to our children. In the Prep we enjoy meeting past pupils to talk about their careers and welcome any other alumni who would like to share their vocations with us.

Mike then went on to the College where both Upper Seniors and A level Physics students were able to learn about careers in Satellite Technology and Engineering.
