Cup Run Continues!

On Tuesday afternoon the U13s continued their successful run in the ESFA Small Schools cup by beating Holy Family, Carlton in the last sixteen to progress to the quarter finals.

The boys started brightly and raced into a two goal lead in the first ten minutes with goals from Harry O and Benat. St Bede's played some outstanding football that began with Dom in goal as they played out from the back, through the thirds and created an array of outstanding chances.

Many of these were converted as they extended their lead to 5-0 with Benat completing a first half hat-trick and Harry O doubling his tally with a finish into the far bottom corner. Holy Family pulled a goal back following a well worked set piece but Benat then recorded his fourth of the afternoon on the stroke of half time to complete a sensational half of football and the boys were 6-1 up at the break.

The second half continued in a similar vein with St Bede's dominating the ball. William had an outstanding game and as well as restricting their main forward to minimal touches he also scored a free kick from forty yards out ten minutes after the break. Further goals were added by Kwame and a fifth for Benat as he completed an unbelievable afternoons work. Holy Family grabbed a consolation goal with a couple of minutes left on the clock, as their forward was rewarded for his tireless running throughout the game.

A final score of 9-2 now means the U13s have scored 37 goals on their route to the quarter final and only conceded 3. They now play at home to Morpeth Newminster Middle School from East Northhumberland - date to be confirmed.

Through this undertaking, Hannah was able to gain a baseline understanding of the sustainability procedures at the College across 8 key sustainability areas, including food waste, plastic and packaging. The assessment supports actions to be taken to achieve the desired goals and aspirations on sustainability.

The environmental assessment will enable the catering team to work closely with the College and develop targeted actions, to implement change. Positively the catering team, are championing recycling, ensuring items go into the correct bins as well as trying to recycle numerous items, aligning with the drive on increased recycling. Most

On Saturday the new term began with a block fixture against QEGS, Blackburn with St Bede's B teams challenging themselves against QEGS' A teams. The only age group in which this differed was the U12 where both the A & B teams took to the field in Blackburn. The U12B team recorded a fantastic 6-2 victory in their first ever outing for the College. St Bede's raced into a 3-0 lead with goals from Kipp (2) and Kayden before QEGS mounted a comeback to leave the game evenly balanced at 3-2 going into the last ten minutes. As QEGS pushed forward for the equaliser St Bede's were able to catch them on the break and added three more goals with man of the match Kipp completing a hat-trick and Rupert and Kayden adding further strikes.

On the A team pitch St Bede's were unlucky to lose 4-2 as although Luca made some outstanding saves the strong wind in the first half helped QEGS and allowed them to race into a 3-0 lead. St Bede's mounted a comeback with two goals from Nna in the space of five minutes, but unfortunately it would be QEGS who grabbed the late goal to extend their lead.

The U13B team put in a valiant display with standout performances coming from Jacob at the back and Alex in net. QEGS dominated much of the play and ran out 5-0 winners with their superb academy forward proving too hot to handle for the B team defence.

At Brantingham Road we welcomed QEGS U14B and U15B and two competitive games ensued. The U14Bs were beaten 2-0 in a compelling game which saw a valiant defensive display from the boys as QEGS dominated the midfield. There were, however, plenty of positives to take into the rest of the season despite the lack of firepower during their first outing. On the U15Bs pitch Patrick scored a fantastic hat-trick with further goals from Markel and Richard securing a 5-2 win over a competitive QEGS outfit. It was also wonderful to see Markel and Tom make their long awaited return to competitive play following long injury layoffs in the first term.



Quarry Bank Mill

Prep 5 rounded off their Victorian topic in history with a visit to Quarry Bank Mill near Styal. The mill was built in 1784 and was a centre for cotton production during the Industrial Revolution. The children spent a day experiencing what life would have been like for Victorian working children.

The day started with a tour of the mill where the children learned about the jobs they would have had to do for 12 hours a day, six days a week for nine years. They only had Sunday and Christmas day off, when they would go to mass. They heard about the dangers for children working in the mill; de-gloving by the carding machine, being crushed or scalped by the spinning machine or being blinded by the loom, not to mention the fact they would inhale cotton dust that would destroy their lungs and would be deaf by their mid-twenties. It was a real eye-opener as to how challenging life was like for children their age.







Next up was the Apprentice House; the children were greeted by Mrs Shawcross who put them into two lines of boys and girls. She put them through their paces to check if they were clean, healthy and bright enough to be an apprentice. Mrs Shawcross was strict, scary and firm but the children learned she was not mean and nasty, as the real Mrs Shawcross had ninety children in her care so it was necessary to have stringent rules in order for the house to run smoothly. They also learned that children were pleased to be an apprentice there; unlike other apprentice houses in Manchester the children here had three meals a day, wore fresh clothes each week and received an education.

It was a fantastic learning opportunity for the children and it also helped them appreciate more the luxuries and life they have today.

The children had a fantastic time talking to Dr Kanani asking her questions about space and writing books.
