
Reading Round Up






Spanish Monsters

The Sixth Form View - The Genius of Isolation

I know that life seems very peculiar at the moment for all of us and we all miss the day to day human contact that we social animals crave. It can also be daunting to work alone, at a desk, with only the bleeps of instant messages to help us complete our seemingly never ending assignments. However, I thought I would use my column to recommend to our Sixth Formers some of the benefits of isolation. History teaches us that it is when we are cut off from our normal lives that we can find true inspiration. Just off the top of my head, I can think of a few examples of times when isolation has been the midwife of genius. I hope they are sufficiently inspiring!

In the summers of the early 1600s, the bubonic plague ravaged London with terrible ferocity for several summers. On all of these occasions, As the bodies piled up in the streets, William Shakespeare was in quarantine at his London home. The theatres having been closed down, he used his time fairly productively to write three new plays: King Lear, Macbeth and Anthony and Cleopatra. It had been during a previous severe bout of pestilence in the 1590s that had led to the white hot creative streak which saw the penning of many of his romantic sonnets as well as the critically acclaimed Venus and Adonis. In the 1660s, it was plague that drove the hypochondriac Isaac Newton into glorious isolation (no real tragedy for the antisocial mathematician). It was whilst sequestered in his rooms that Newton, encountering a problem for which convention mathematics was insufficient, created a whole new branch of mathematics. I'm reliably informed that Calculus is quite important for the general effort of counting! It is believed that it was also the plague, in its original 1347 Black Death form, which forced the composer Giulaume de Machat into hiding. It was at this time he wrote the first complete scoresheet for the high mass - Messe de Nostre Dame - one of the greatest choral masterpieces of all time.

For quite different reasons to do with mental health (he had recently parted company with his own ear) Vincent Van Gough was admitted to a 'House of Health'. Left alone, with one room for sleeping and another which served as a makeshift studio, he painted ceaselessly. One of the results of Vincent

being distraction free was Starry Night. An artist from an earlier century, Michelangelo, infamously went into hiding in a small cell under a chapel in the Vatican. Whilst on the run from the furious Medici family, he drew on the walls with charcoal to pass the time. The results, discovered by chance in 1975, are fairly breath-taking. You should check them out!

During the summer of 1816 the world was pretty much in lockdown because of the 'Volcanic Winter' caused by the eruption of Mount Tambora the year before. It was whilst closeted together with his group of friends at lake Como that Lord Byron suggested to the company, which included the poet and libertine Percy Bysshe Shelley, that they have a ghost story writing competition. In the vent it was Percy's nineteen year old wife Mary who took up the challenge. The result was the gothic horror masterpiece Frankenstein. Another guest, John Polidori contributed a story called The Vampyre which would later be the inspiration for Bram Stoker's Dracula. Later on in the 19th century John Henry Newman wrote three sonnets whilst when quarantined on board a cholera ridden ship. Interestingly, it was also whilst spending seventeen days in quarantine aboard another ship infected with cholera that Thackeray was able to find the time to finish off his novel Barry Lyndon. Less lucky was the composer Stravinsky who contracted the potentially deadly typhoid fever in 1913. As he convalesced in a nursing him, he managed to begin work on his marvellous opera The Nightingale which he finished whilst his wife was isolated with tuberculosis in the Alps.

There can be no doubt that working alone can be tough. However, it is at those moments where momentous, even tragic, events make out world contract that we can listen to inner voice and work with greater clarity and insight. It's as if our very longing for the world we have temporally lost transmogrifies into white hot creativity and industry. Use this time, really focus on your studies but also make time for those around you. The world will be waiting for you when this is over.
