Signing In and Out

If a pupil arrives after 9.05am, he/she is late. Latecomers must register at the main office.

If a pupil needs to leave College (to go to a doctor or dentist, for example) they must have permission and they must sign out. Parents should seek permission providing documentary evidence of medical or other appointments. On their return they must remember to sign back in at the main office.

Absences

If a pupil is off with illness or needs time off to attend an appointment, please email their form tutor, including attendance@sbcm.co.uk in your email.

Planned absences such as holidays are authorised by Mrs Kemp. Please email Mrs Ward in this instance and she will facilitate this request.

Uniform

Please be aware that we have a strict policy on our uniform requirements. If you are in any doubt please contact the College for clarification so as not to incur any unnecessary expense.

Please keep your uniform clean and neat

- All items should be clearly marked with your name.
- Remember to allow for growth when buying uniform
- Correct College uniform should be worn at all times
- All outdoor coats to be navy blue without branding
- Blazers should be worn at all times around College (permission must be sought from a teacher to remove a blazer during a lesson)
- Coats must not be worn indoors
- Top buttons must always be done up and ties should be full length
- Girls' skirt length must not be modified

Be proud to wear your uniform – please note:

- Exaggerated or dyed/coloured hairstyles in unnatural hair colours are not permitted. Styles which are too short around the sides and longer on the top are not permitted. Girls' hair accessories must be simple and navy blue in colour.
- Shoes must be traditional school style in black (no logos) and in no way to be termed a 'trainer style'
- Boys must wear grey or black socks
- Girls shoes must be black, small heel is acceptable
- Girls must wear navy socks or navy or black tights
- No jewellery is allowed except for a wristwatch
- One gold or silver stud, in the lobe of each ear, may be worn by the girls
- Make-up, nail varnish and fake tan are not allowed
- No hooded tops should be worn under the blazer
- Boys must be clean shaven
- No headscarves, hats, or attire that covers the faces are allowed

The Headteacher reserves the right to send home any pupil whose appearance does not conform to the College regulations. The Head of Year will check uniform on the first day of the Autumn term.

Bags

College bags should not be left in corridors. Instead, they should be kept in the lockers provided. Students must buy their own padlock for their locker^{*}. It is important that pupils do not carry unnecessary books in their bags and pupils should only carry books necessary for their imminent lessons. Bags are part of the uniform and must not be decorated or defaced.

Transport

St. Bede's College runs a dedicated coach service to and from College for a number of areas including stops at Manchester Piccadilly and Victoria train stations. The recent and continued expansion of the Metrolink service across Greater Manchester is good news for current and prospective parents of St Bede's College students.

Using our bus service can help the environment and reduce local traffic congestion, whilst reducing parental stress and saving time. Zeelo is the travel company that provides buses for the College. When you contact Zeelo and share your location they will suggest the most appropriate bus routes. Zeelo has an app where you can see if your child has "tapped in" on the bus and the location of the bus en route. If you are planning to use the school bus service, please spend time in the summer familiarising your child with the route and rehearsing how to walk home from their stop.

House System

At St Bede's College we have four houses in the House system: Bosco, Campion, Magdelene and Siena. A key aspect of this system is that pupils feel part of a wider college family and that they forge friendships with students from other years.

Healthy competition in sport, drama and other areas engenders a spirit of co-operation and provides opportunities for pupils from all year groups to show both leadership and organisational ability.

Strictly Bede's, The Rolo initiative and Sports Day are well established events throughout the school calendar. It is the sense of belonging that enriches the House System.

Each House has a Head of House who oversees the events and activities, and the year culminates in a Day of fun activities.

The House system begins in the Prep school and siblings are allocated to the same house to create a family tradition. Older pupils provide guidance and support to the younger ones. This helps new pupils settle into life at St. Bede's quickly and they rapidly feel part of the community.

Catering

College Meals

All dining services at St Bede's College are provided by our contractors, Harrisons.

Meals are served daily in the College Dining Room. There is a cafeteria service and pupils can choose from a wide range of hot and cold dishes, street food, along with fresh home baked cakes and a selection of fresh fruit.

There is a set charge for each meal. We offer a meal deal which is a main course and vegetables with a hot pudding. We also offer several grab and go options.

The College operates a cashless catering system. Once pupils have selected their choice, they will place their thumb on a biometric scanner.

Co-Curricular

The College runs a wide range of activities during lunchtime and also after College. These are staffed by teachers, students and professional coaches. Technology

Cloud Based Communication, ISAMS Schools Management System and Chromebooks

At St Bede's College we have always been very innovative when it comes to carrying out educational and organisational changes to ensure our students achieve their best. St Bede's is "the place to be", the place to work hard and where the entire Educational Community joins forces so that our students reach their academic potential.

We use iSAMS Management System that will provide parents with all the important information they want to see about their child.

The Parent Portal will allow access to up to date contacts, all things related to College Life - registration information and if they have missed lessons through illness, Curriculum and Learning - from what your child is studying, their timetable, summary of reports and more. ISAMS will provide a really good link between parents and the College.

Parent Mail App: Platform linked to iSams to top up lunch money and pay for school trips. Log in details will be sent out in September.

Class Charts is an online system which teachers use to track achievement and behaviour throughout the school day, informing parents automatically by email and/or through the online portal or the mobile app. Log in codes are sent out in September and we actively encourage parents to engage with the app.

As new technologies continue to change the world, they also provide many new and positive educational benefits for teaching and learning. Part of our mission at St Bede's College is to "Inspire Excellence", and we believe that, if used correctly, new technologies can help achieve this by making our students more creative, more independent, and better able to take advantage of the different styles of learning available.

St Bede's College believes that providing Chromebooks will offer students opportunities that will inspire and motivate them to achieve their full potential and fully engage in their learning. The school believes that using the Chromebooks will enhance everyday learning and teaching, and in particular, will:

- Raise educational attainment
- Create a student centred curriculum which will provide engaging lessons
- Enable students access to the most up to date educational resources
- Raise levels of engagement, motivation and interaction
- Promote remote / home learning
- Improve self-management

Pupils must arrive every day with a charged Chromebook and their charger. <u>Chromebook Use and</u> <u>Security Policy</u> helps educate and inform students about the use of their technology on the College site.

Awards System

House Points

Awarded in recognition of pupils' achievement, consistency and putting full effort into their work, and to pupils who strengthen the life of the College with their positive attitude and good behaviour. House points milestone awards are given to pupils, who are presented with a badge to recognise the award.

Some of the ways that HOUSE POINTS can be earned are:


- Achievement in a specific piece of work, activity or assignment
- Demonstrating consistency in any area of the curriculum or school life e.g. always completing homework to the best of their ability or always smiling and being polite
- Displaying a positive attitude or a concerted effort in a particular area e.g. working hard in an area of weakness, co-curricular or House involvement

Postcards

Achievement Postcards are sent home when pupils have completed some outstanding work, have been consistently excellent or have gone above and beyond for the College Community.

Headteacher Commendations

Commendation Certificates are awarded by the Headteacher once a term and are presented at a Celebration Assembly. They are in recognition to those pupils who have been a true BEDIAN example to the College community (50 House Points).



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BEDIAN Ambassador

To encourage seeing and appreciating each other's good behaviour, once a month the pupils of each form will vote for the child amongst them who lived the virtues well, being a good Bedian example to the rest. The tutor then gives the Bedian Ambassador reward and the badge to the child with the most votes (25 House Points).

Postcards

Achievement Postcards are sent home by HOYs and HODs in recognition of a particularly outstanding piece of work or for consistent exemplary work and behaviour throughout the half term (10 House Points).

House Points

These are awarded using ClassCharts, in recognition of pupils' achievement, consistency and effort, and to pupils who strengthen the life of the College through virtue by their positive attitude and good behaviour (1 House Point)









Bedian Ambassador

To encourage seeing and appreciating each other's good behaviour, once every half term the pupils of each form will vote for the child amongst them who lived the virtues well, being a good Bedian example to the rest. The tutor then gives the Bedian Ambassador reward (25 House Point) to the child with the most votes.

Form of the Half Term

Recognising well-rounded achievement, the "Form of the Half Term" distinction is awarded to the Form Group of each Year demonstrating exceptional performance across multiple factors. This includes contributions to the House system, exemplary embodiment of the Bedian spirit, and consistent academic excellence.

General Recognition of Achievement

Heads of Year endeavour to highlight excellent achievement of any kind at their Information Assemblies – hence LAMDA, ABRSM and Maths and Science Challenge Certificates are distributed. Pupils' and Team achievements are lauded each week at the Year Assembly for all year groups. Badges (sports teams) are worn by pupils.

Displays & Publications

Different aspects of College life are highlighted through display around the College and on the Honours Boards in the College entrance. Pupils' endeavours are published in the monthly Bede's News and local and national press as appropriate.

Behaviour for Learning Awards

Behaviour for Learning Awards are badges, both physical and digital, that are given to students in recognition of their achievement of House Points. 4 levels of recognition are established, accessing each category according to the number of House Points obtained by the students. Students are proud to obtain these badges and wear them both on their Class Charts digital profile and as part of their uniform.



Upper Third Retreat

Each year, the whole of the Upper Third year group goes away for a two-night retreat. This year the retreat is taking place in Alton Castle, where pupils will get to develop stronger connections with their peers and deepen their faith.
