Water Safety During the Summer

How many accidental drownings were there in 2023?

Answer: 157

Most were young males. June, July and August are the highest months for accidental drowning. More people die inland than at the coast, in rivers, canals, reservoirs and quarries. During May half-term in 2023, four teenagers died in just one week jumping into cold water at inland locations.

Even if young people are strong swimmers, they can suffer with cold water shock on immersion. The body reacts involuntarily to the cold water, causing blood vessels in the skin to close, making it harder for blood to flow around the body. The heart has to work harder and blood pressure increases. In the worst case scenario a heart attack can happen.

Gasping, which is a natural response to cold water, can also mean that water could be breathed in. Breathing rates can go up by as much as ten times.

All these reactions can cause panic, getting into difficulty and drowning.






















































Wax Museum




Translation Competition

St Bede's at D-Day





On the 6th June, we paused to commemorate 80 years since the courageous Allied D-Day Normandy landings, a pivotal moment in history that led to victory in World War II. Among those who bravely stood on the shores of Normandy were two remarkable Old Bedians, whose names grace our War Memorials as eternal symbols of sacrifice and bravery.

Lennard Eaton Smith, born on January 4th, 1913, and Gerard Wilton, born on April 2nd, 1923, both answered the call of duty with unwavering courage. Lennard, a Gentlemen's Outfitter, and Gerard, a proud member of the Royal Armoured Corps (RAC), stood shoulder to shoulder with their comrades, facing the perils of war with unyielding resolve.

Their stories, etched in the annals of history, remind us of the bravery and selflessness displayed by the greatest generation. As we honour their memory today, let us never forget the sacrifices made by these brave souls, whose valour and dedication paved the way for the freedoms we cherish.




St Bede's College Normandy Trip

From Monday, 17th June to Friday, 21st June, a group of 40 pupils and staff members from St Bede's College embarked on an educational and memorable trip to Normandy, France. The journey was filled with enriching experiences, historical insights and opportunities for personal growth.



The adventure began with a bus journey from Manchester to Portsmouth, followed by a scenic ferry ride to Caen. Upon arrival, the group settled into their accommodation at Le Château de la Baudonnière, a historic estate with a fascinating past. This château passed hands between numerous families and individuals throughout the 1900s and was even used as a command office after being occupied by the German military during WWII. This intriguing history added a unique dimension to our stay.

Day Two

The group visited a traditional French market in Villedieu-les-Poêles, a town known for its bell foundries and copperware. Pupils experienced the vibrant local culture and sampled regional delicacies. They practised their French phrases, saying "bonjour" to vendors and trying out "fromage" and "baguettes." This was followed by a visit to the iconic Mont Saint-Michel, a medieval abbey perched on a rocky island, offering stunning views and a rich historical backdrop.

Day Three

The third day was dedicated to exploring significant World War II sites. The group travelled to Arromanches, where they experienced the 360-degree cinema, immersing themselves in the events of D-Day with the "Arromanches 360" experience. This was followed by a reflective walk on the "plages du débarquement" (landing beaches) and a poignant visit to the American Cemetery at Colleville.





Day Four

Day four was spent at Le Château de la Baudonnière, where pupils engaged in various activities, including "fabrication de pain" (bread making), "tir à l'arc" (archery) and "course d'orientation" (orienteering). These activities not only offered fun and learning but also a glimpse into French history and traditions. The day concluded with a traditional French meal, featuring "escargots," "gratin dauphinois," "fromage de chèvre," and "tarte aux pommes," offering a delightful culinary experience.







Day Five

The pupils enjoyed their return journey, feeling as if they were on a cruise thanks to the gorgeous sunshine. It was a perfect ending to a trip filled with learning, cultural immersion, and camaraderie.




























Sparking Curiosity and Creativity Through Dance

Music Enrichment at Manchester Metropolitan University



Two of our Lower Sixth students, Frankie and Siena, are thrilled to have been awarded places on <u>The Awakening Project</u>. For a week at the end of July, they will enjoy personalised mentorship with tutors associated with the University of Oxford and the Canterbury Institute. The project encourages critical thinking, giving students early exposure to diverse points of view and demonstrating the benefits to freedom of inquiry. They are encouraged to reflect on work habits, virtues, decision-making, life goals, moral principles, and the deeper purpose of one's university years.

Last year's Head Boy, Aaron A, was lucky enough to take part in the project and thoroughly enjoyed it. As well as invaluable tutorials, he experienced walking tours of Oxford at night by historians, went punting and was taken around the Ashemolian by a mediaeval history and literature professor to learn how to look at and engage with art. He had tutorials in, and was allowed to explore, numerous colleges across the city.

Frankie and Siena are very excited to head off to Oxford in a few weeks. Frankie explained that she applied in order to meet students on the course she wants to complete, to learn what it will entail and how to prepare for it. She said she wants to set herself up for success and to "broaden my understanding of what it means to study Chemistry and further challenge myself by being exposed to a range of undergraduate topics." Siena is looking forward to enhancing her understanding of medical science and wants to "understand medicine from outside of my work experience and textbooks that I have read. I am most looking forward to having discussions with my assigned tutor who is currently studying health policy and global health research at Oxford University. Being exposed to the political side of healthcare will allow me to have a well rounded understanding of medicine and experience the study of medical science from a different point of view."

A Week in my Dream Job

For as long as I can remember, being a vet has always been the only thing I have wanted to do. I have always had a passion for animals. Growing up in Hong Kong, a large and busy city, my interactions with animals were primarily limited to pets and occasional visits to urban animal shelters. The city's fast-paced environment is vastly different from the tranquil and calm English countryside, which made my work experience at Willows Farm Vets particularly enlightening and refreshing.

During my work experience, I was fortunate to gain firsthand experience, which provided valuable insights into the farm side of veterinary medicine. On my first day, I arrived at the office in the morning, and soon enough one of the vets received a call and we headed to a farm. I was lucky enough to be able to assist with pregnancy scans on dairy cows. I learned how vets play an important role in ensuring that the cows are in the best condition to maintain their health and productivity. By monitoring the health of the cows, vets help farmers to maximise their profit through improved herd fertility and milk production, which in turn supports the economic stability of farms. Having never encountered farm animals this close up, it was very rewarding to see the farm side of veterinary medicine.

Another valuable experience I had was at the Royal Cheshire Show. This event featured a wide variety of animals, including cows, pigs, sheep, alpacas, and even owls, showcasing the diversity of farm and domestic animals. While assisting the Willows Farm Vets with hospitality and emergency aid, I had the opportunity to explore the show's various competitions and exhibitions, which were both educational and entertaining. This work experience not only expanded my knowledge of veterinary medicine but also reinforced my commitment to pursuing a career as a vet. It provided me with a deeper understanding of the responsibilities and challenges faced by farm vets and inspired me to continue developing my skills and knowledge in this field.

A Fight Promoter with a Purpose: Inspirational Victor Theriault Visits St. Bede's College

The celebrated fight promoter, Victor Theriault, recently made an inspiring visit to St Bede's College Sixth Form. Known for his role in organising some of the most thrilling kickboxing and MMA bouts of our time, Victor took a step away from his duties to share his journey with students, emphasising the values of resilience, hard work and passion.

Victor, born in 1956, was one of 6 boys. After losing his father at a young age, his mother, Flora, was left to raise the boys on her own. With big dreams to finish Nursing school, the boys were placed in various foster care homes throughout their childhood until they could all be reunited with their mother, a Nursing graduate. Victor shared many moments in his life where he felt afraid and knew that he needed to learn how to defend himself, such as bullying incidents and the time a young man threatened him with a knife. He spoke about these difficult moments in his life to tell Sixth Formers that, without them, he likely wouldn't have developed his life-long passion for martial arts.

Growing up, most of the Theriault boys practised Japanese Jiu-Jitsu, kickboxing and/or Karate, with Victor's brother, Jean-Yves Theriault (The Iceman), demonstrating a natural ability in fighting that eventually led to him becoming 23-time World Kickboxing Champion known for his knockouts. Victor became incredibly dedicated to Karate and trained relentlessly to become a Canadian Karate champion. With Victor's background, he later became the Iceman's corner man and main event promoter, travelling with him around the world to both support him and organise the events that were broadcast on major TV networks. Victor isn't only passionate about martial arts, but about the beauty of a martial arts show: getting the right people, lighting, decor, sponsors, production and fighters. Since then, both Victor and Jean-Yves have been world-renowned as two very important figures who dominated the kickboxing space in the '80s and '90s and whose legacy lives on today.










A career in the kickboxing world gave Victor many new contacts, and thus, opportunities that still follow him today. Notably, an MMA event held in 1996 - the first ever of its kind in the world - was shut down by the police due to legal disputes. This, however, started the process of legalising MMA, which has given reign to popular events now such as the UFC. Throughout his career, he has had the honour of working with legends such as Jean-Claude Van Damme, Chuck Norris and Mike Tyson. He even trained George St-Pierre for his last fight to help him improve his striking! One of his proudest moments was promoting Vitaly Klitschko's first kickboxing title bout in Las Vegas. Victor reiterated to the Sixth Form that it was only through hard work and resilience that these things were possible. Specifically, it is important to seize the opportunities when they come to you and believe in destiny and the Lord's path.

When visiting the Sixth Form, Victor shared his new venture with a video game called TaeBo Reboot, which is a martial arts virtual reality fitness project. This initiative is designed to revolutionise fitness and inspire the next generation to embrace physical activity. His goal is to give back to society by helping young people find their own strength, discipline and resilience through martial arts. During the session, Lyndon M tried out the virtual reality game live, which was very exciting to watch.

Victor's presentation was inspiring, motivational and one that students will remember for a long time. He made sure to reiterate that even when things are hard, it is vital that one does not give up. Tackle the obstacles. Discover your passion and pursue it relentlessly. Take what the Lord gives you and use it to motivate you. Make sure that what you love will make a positive impact on the world.



It is the depth of scholarship and mastery of the historical conext which places Lawrence's book far ahead of any of the dry school histories one sees elsewhere. It is a triumph of scholarship and we are indebted to Lawrence for the fifteen years of sweat and toil he poured into his labour of love.

The resounding success of the evening has made us all the more determined to move forward with more exciting alumni events which will be announced soon. It was a pleasure to connect and reconnect with so many Old Bedians, hear their stories and tap into a store of mutual love for our wonderful school.


